A prolific shoplifter has been arrested and charged, he was remanded and sentenced to 10 weeks in prison. We hope this reassures local businesses that we will, and we are, continuing to deal with persistent offenders.

This month has also seen Harborough & Lutterworth officers safely detain and arrest a wanted man from Bristol. Hidden in his waistband was what could be described as a 'Crocodile Dundee style hunting knife'. The man was later charged and remanded.

Chief Constable Simon Cole visited Harborough Police Station and joined one of our morning briefings. Social distancing is being observed in all meetings and PPE is available for officers to use a the team continue to work hard, dealing with day to day local issues as well as supporting the ongoing #StayHomeSaveLives message.



Domestic abuse - where to get help during the COVID-19 pandemic

Please remember that you can still call **999** if you or someone else is in danger. While some services may not be able to offer face to face meetings, there is still help and advice available locally and nationally online and over the phone.

Outstanding work

Across the force, officers are going above and beyond in their duties every day. This includes Beat Officer, PC Maciej (Mack) Sokolowski, who, despite being on the frontline is also producing face straps for healthcare staff using his 3D printing company. Some 350 have already been delivered to the Leicester Royal Infirmary, while others have gone elsewhere across the country.

The straps are designed to help alleviate discomfort around the ears that can be caused by the elastic on the masks.

In addition, police volunteers have also delivered hundreds of pharmacy packages to vulnerable people across Leicester, Leicestershire, and Rutland and continue to do so.
